
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# Mornington Peninsula, Victoria

## Crab that will knock you sideways!

Arguably the dish Singapore is most famous for, chilli crab is just one of the red-hot reasons you need to spare some time to hit the streets of this bustling city searching for some tasty salvation from the crowds. Despite the ancient metropolis claiming chilli crab as its unofficial national dish, the origins of its creation don't stretch back too far. The credit for its invention belong to husband and wife street vendors who, rumour has it, haphazardly threw together some stir-fried crabs mixed with some bottled chilli and tomato sauce from a pushcart. The rest was salivating history.

To make sure you aren't clawing your way around the streets looking for the best chilli crab dishes, here are a couple of places you simply need to shell out for to get you started.

### Jumbo Seafood

The award-winning restaurant has gained a loyal following from crab connoisseurs wanting one of the freshest crab dishes in Singapore. The signature chill crab here is its best seller, boasting a combo of Malay and Indian spices such as turmeric, lemongrass and candlenuts. For the record, the black pepper crab here is also quite tasty.

### Roland Restaurant

Operating for close to 70 years, Roland Restaurant is where it all began, with the inventors starting out with just a few wooden tables and some kerosene lamps along the banks of the Kallang River. Here, the locals would take a seat and eat some of the freshest seafood around. Today the restaurant is a flourishing enterprise, serving traditional chilli crab the way it always was, with a crusty French loaf and some of the eatery's famous dipping sauce.



In the News

## Domestic booking boom

Last night's long-awaited reopening of the border between NSW and Victoria has seen a massive spike in flight bookings, with both Qantas and Virgin Australia reporting a strong rebound in demand.

Qantas/Jetstar will today operate a combined 17 return flights between Sydney and Melbourne, while the newly relaunched Virgin Australia will ramp up from an initial four daily services on the route, as well as bringing forward the relaunch of four weekly flights between Melbourne and Newcastle.

Qantas will also today start

a new route between Sydney and Mildura, while flights from Sydney to Bendigo will resume early next month.

After the announcement that the border would reopen earlier this month Qantas said it sold more than 25,000 seats in the first 48 hours.

## Huge demand for cruise trial

Royal Caribbean International says it has received more than 100,000 expressions of interest from keen cruisers wanting to take part in special "mock cruises" which have been ordered by the US Centers for Disease Control (CDC) to help pave the way for a cruise resumption.

Guidelines issued by the CDC have laid out procedures for a safe phased return to cruising, with the test voyages aiming to test and refine measures aiming to mitigate the spread of COVID.

Cruise operators are carefully working on new measures, with the mock cruises expected to take place from January 2021 and several lines now confirming they are not return to normal operation until April.

A clause in the CDC plan also requires US cruises to be a maximum of one week long, meaning cruise lines are in the process of cancelling longer voyages calling at American ports through until the beginning of November next year.

Happily such a holiday is within easy reach; all you have to do is zero in on something a little left-of-field such as one of our top picks below:

## Las Vegas

It's not the first destination that comes to mind for a family holiday we'll grant you that, but if you can get past the 'Sin City' label (and all three of *The Hangover* movies), Vegas

with its multitude of kid-friendly attractions and entertainment options is a surprisingly great family holiday destination.

Make a base of Aria, a chic hotel that's home to over 4,000 rooms, 16 restaurants and a 20,000m<sup>2</sup> pool, then pencil in the following as 'must sees': Circus Circus which is an indoor amusement park housed under a pink dome; Siegfried and Roy's Secret Garden & Dolphin Habitat; and High Roller; a 500-feet tall observation wheel which

takes in views of the whole area. Off the strip, Treehouse Playground at Downtown Container Park and Discovery Children's Museum will continue to delight kids and kidults alike.

Got time for a show? Kids of all ages will enjoy *Lake of Dreams* at Wynne, David Copperfield at MGM Grand Hotel and Casino, and Gregory Popovich's *Comedy Pet Theatre*. Sadly, *Zombie Burlesque* may just have to wait for another visit.



# Singapore

Once considered a mere stopover hub, Singapore is fast becoming one of the leading Asian holiday destinations for young families – largely due to the overwhelming popularity of Sentosa Island – an island resort located south of the city.

Teeming with family friendly activities, your best bet is to check into Shangri-La's Rasa Sentosa, a wonderland for kids which has everything from a Flying Trapeze to a Sea Sports Centre. It will be difficult to get the kids to leave Shangri-La's premises, but all the cajoling will be worth it; outside the property's gates, endless entertainment options such as Universal Studios, Skyline Luge and Wave House await. Help get them on board by showing them the sentosa.com site for full listings.

Should you head into the city, tack on a stroll through the colourful Gardens by the Bay; take a night safari; or simply just enjoy the activities that are part of the gorgeous Marina Bay Sands such as the ice-skating rink, a sampan (boat) ride through the canals of the hotel's The Shoppes, or even just a swim in its famous infinity pool.

# French Polynesia

Often dismissed as the kind of place where oligarchs pay for cocktails with handfuls of sweaty diamonds, this tropical paradise is working hard to cater to young families, and the good news is, there are now plenty of options at every price point.

At the higher end of the scale, Bora Bora's Four Seasons, and St Regis are the main players when it comes to providing little ones with fantastic kids clubs, amenities and activities, but Moorea's InterContinental Resort Moorea and Manava Beach Resort and Spa aren't too far behind.





Those who are on a tighter budget are also in luck; private accommodation rental across Tahiti is booming which means families can now rent a private overwater bungalow complete with kayaks and bicycles for as little as \$100 a night. Add to that a long list of natural pursuits the whole family can enjoy – be it hiking through the mountains, meandering around caves and waterfalls or diving and snorkelling at some of the world's top sites, and you have the perfect holiday.

# Dubai

From camel-riding and camping out in the desert to undertaking a wide range of thrill-seeking activities within its city limits, a visit to glamorous Dubai can be a wondrous experience for kids of all ages.

First, there are the gargantuan hotels such as Atlantis The Palm, a 1500-room mega-resort which is not only home to Aquaventure, Dubai's largest water park (guests of the hotel can enter free of charge), but also features an impressive 11-million-litre aquarium, marine encounters and kids club. Check in, and use the hotel as a base to explore all the fun activities – most of which are located within the Dubai's equally gargantuan shopping malls.

At the Mall of the Emirates for example, kids can enjoy the craziness that is Ski Dubai, an indoor ski field complete with chair lift, snow luge and tobogganing, while at The Dubai Mall, families can fly an A380 in a simulator, ice-skate or 'work' in one of over 80 professions at KidZania play land.

Outside (provided you haven't come here in the middle of summer when temperatures soar past 45 degrees), take an abra across the creek and explore the souks of the old city. It could be an education for everyone involved; it will certainly be a breath of fresh air.

## Australia's famed food festivals



### Tasting Australia, SA

Any festival with a name as indicative as this has a lot to live up to, and Tasting Australia never disappoints. Billing itself as “where foodies come to discover what’s new on the menu”, Tasting Australia takes place over 10 days, spotlighting the food and drink of its host state, South Australia, but also offering up the best from the rest of the country, including its chefs, winemakers, producers, restaurateurs and more.

### Melbourne Food & Wine Festival, VIC

Melbourne likes to appoint itself as the king of [insert latest trend here], but admittedly, it certainly comes to the table with its annual Food & Wine Festival. More than 200 events take place in this celebration of gastronomy, which hosts food & drink masterclasses, events such as the ‘World’s Longest Lunch’, and more.



### Taste of Tasmania, TAS

Tasmania is coming into its own as a destination, period, and this rapid ascent is occurring in the food sector as quickly as any other. A large part of that is owed to the Taste of Tasmania, Australia’s largest and longest running food and wine festival. Located on Hobart’s waterfront and featuring Tasmania’s finest flavours, this carnival-like festival is the perfect way to spend a summer night. While the 2020/21 festival has been cancelled due to COVID-19, we can’t wait for next year!

### Margaret River Gourmet Escape, WA

Offering up endless supplies of surf and wine, there may not be a more iconically Australian town than Margaret River, so there’s no surprise this South West WA location now also hosts a premier food festival, Margaret River Gourmet Escape. This festival features three days of chefs, vintners and foodies converging for beach barbecues, long table lunches, cooking demonstrations, wine tastings and Q&A sessions.



# Keep your cruising dream alive

Dining is a key part of your cruising experience, so to help you choose which ship you should sail on next, we're bringing you a series of comparisons of onboard dining. This week, take a look at the asian dining options onboard family cruise lines.

## Teppanyaki Norwegian Cruise Line

Teppanyaki is one of the many food options available on most of Norwegian Cruise Line's ships. The restaurant costs US\$29.95 per person and is available for dinner, and for the cost you won't just get a delicious Japanese dinner, but also a show, with the chefs showing off amazing skills of juggling, slicing and dicing your meal in front of you. The three-course meal includes miso soup, a main course and dessert, with highlights including chicken yakiudon, filet mignon and jumbo shrimp.



## Bonsai Sushi Carnival Cruise Line

Cruisers looking for a casual lunch or dinner can head to Bonsai Sushi, with the restaurant offering a range of sushi and bento boxes. Diners pay extra per item, with small sushi rolls from as little as \$1.50. You can watch as the chefs roll your sushi at the bar or else enjoy your meal at one of the many tables. All your Japanese favourites are on the menu including California sushi rolls, yellow fin tuna sashimi, yakitori and ramen.



## Izumi Royal Caribbean International

Enjoy sushi, sashimi, nigiri and more at Izumi, with this a la carte dining restaurant available for at lunch and dinner for an additional cost. Izumi is a Japanese restaurant, so expect some delicious, high quality dishes including shrimp and vegetable tempura, octopus yuzu chimichurri, fried udon noodles with your choice of chicken, beef, shrimp or tofu or sushi rolls such as the chef's signature baked snow crab and salmon dynamite roll.



## Dragon Lady P&O Cruises

If variety is what you're after, head to Dragon Lady, with the restaurant offering a range of dishes from across Asia. Dragon Lady is open every night and includes Chinese, Thai, Korean, Vietnamese, Indian and Japanese cuisine. Highlights include miso-poached chicken or Thai red curry for entrée and grilled snapper Marsala or vegetable noodles with bok choy and lotus root for main course. Dragon Lady is very popular so bookings are recommended, but cruisers won't have to pay extra to enjoy the restaurant.



## Kaito MSC Cruises

Japanese favourites including sushi, sashimi and tempura are available at Kaito on MSC ships. Kaito Teppanyaki is a stylish Japanese restaurant with four cooking stations allowing travellers to watch their food prepared in front of them on an open grill. There are less flames at Kaito Sushi but no less quality food, with fresh sushi prepared on the spot. Both Kaito Teppanyaki and Sushi are available on four of MSC's cruise ships, while the sushi bar alone is on some vessels.



## Silk Road Dream Cruises

Dream Cruises' Silk Road restaurant offers Chinese dishes in an atmosphere of old world glamour. The menu includes a range of unique dishes with a contemporary twist and travellers can choose a set menu or select dishes. The dining venue is on *Genting Dream*, *World Dream* and *Explorer Dream* and is open for both lunch and dinner. The restaurant also hosts a cabaret show after 11pm, and prices to dine here after 11pm are dependent on how close to the stage your table is.

In 1979 the government was overthrown and the flag was modified to the current one - the sun and lion emblems were removed and replaced with a new coat of arms, while a stylized inscription was added to the top and bottom of the stripes.
